AIDS IN THE BLACK COMMUNITY

In the United States, 25% of those diagnosed with AIDS are Black men, women, and children. In metropolitan cities such as the District of Columbia, Philadelphia, Oakland, Atlanta, New York, Chicago, and Baltimore, the incidence of AIDS among Blacks is even higher—as much as 50% or more.

***3 of every 5 children with AIDS
are Black***

***1 of every 2 women with AIDS
is Black***

***9 out of every 10 prisoners with AIDS
are People of Color***

In light of these staggering statistics, the AIDS crisis must be a concern of everyone, particularly Black institutions and community leaders.
